REUBEN TELLS TALES

"Be careful about what you learn from foreigners," he advised the lads. "Their gods are not like the Holy One of Israel. Their gods are wicked and unpredictable and play with the lives of men and women as if they were of no account. The Lord God has taught us to see how He loves the people He has made and guided them through patriarchs and judges, prophets, priests and kings. What went on before them, we just have the stories our forefathers told to each. Now we have Moses and the prophets to tell us how to live under God's good rule."

"All people have tales of the start of things, but we have learnt differently. Their stories also tell of happenings long ago, floods and disasters, but we have learned that the Lord God is a loving creator who really speaks to those who obey Him and guides them the right way. We learn from Him about right and wrong, crime and punishment, national conduct that God has praised or condemned, about covenants made for our blessing."

"My Dad says we are living here because we had wicked kings and false prophets and God is punishing us for all that," said Dan.

"It looks like that," Reuben replied. "I am sure that God will restore us again in His good time. While we are here we must learn wisdom so that when we get back to our own country we are ready to change everything for the better. 'Righteousness exalts a nation', remember. Now let me sit and rest in the evening sunshine and you go away and play."

3 large baking potatoes, cubed


21/4 pints water

Salt and pepper for seasoning




Melt the butter in a large pan and fry the onions.

Fairtrade Fortnight 2024 date change

FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT 2024

This is the time of year when I publicise Fairtrade Fortnight, remind you of options to buy Fairtrade goods and invite you to join a Big Brew to raise money to fight trade injustice. However, 2024 is going to be a bit different.

2024 is the 30th anniversary of the FAIRTRADE Mark and in order to fully celebrate its life-changing impact for farmers and workers across the world, events will be happening throughout the year leading up to new dates for Fairtrade Fortnight, from 9th to 22nd September. That isn't an excuse to do nothing until the autumn; Fairtrade goods are available all year round and maybe 2024 is the year for us all to add an extra Fairtrade item to our weekly grocery shop or to explore purchasing different Fairtrade items such as clothing or cleaning products. Please continue to think about the items you buy, where they come from, whether their producers are paid and treated fairly, and how the way goods are produced affects the environment. GARDENING FOR FEBRUARY, 2024

Happy Gardening New Year. The weather will need to change (writing 22nd January) and the storms stop - for the first time we have damage to a greenhouse with a top pane blown out last night. Rainfall in 2023 was the highest I have recorded at 30 Callerton Court (over 26 years) at 43.5 inches. It only put the average up to 33.83 inches but was over 10 inches higher. The wettest month was October and the driest February. Rainfall in the second half of the year was more than 76% of the total for the year. If this pattern is to continue gardeners will need to look at the most suitable crops and flowering plants to grow, the timing of sowing/planting and the husbandry. It has been almost impossible to work on the cropped area of our garden since the end of August. We will also have to consider crops that can be harvested before rats and mice eat them - they damaged most of our beetroot last year. If the pattern of recent spring is going to be repeated we will be considering leaving cultivation work until the spring rather than attempting to clear in the autumn months. I have nothing to offer on best value composts yet but you can be assured that Which? will only have been testing peat-free so if you will be looking for composts containing peat I suggest you start now. Halls of Heddon had the best selection of peatcontaining composts of the centres I visited last year.



The plant Gunnera (the South American giant rhubarb) can grow to a height of two metres and is to be completely banned. Gunnera Tinctoria was banned in 2019 as an invasive species similar to Japanese Knotweed. However, Gunnera Manicata was deemed safe and has remained widely available – and widely planted in people's gardens. But a research project led by the Royal Horticultural Society

(RHS) has found that almost all of "safe" plants are in fact a cross with the banned species. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra, for whom I worked in 2000 on Foot & Mouth eradication) have said "Members of the public who identify this plant growing in their garden do not need to take action. However you cannot intentionally plant, sell, use or exchange the species given its status as an invasive alien species." The only colony of Gunnera that I know of is on the side of road linking the

Scots Gap road to Wallington bridge. I have known of it for over 67 years and it does not appear to be spreading. The RHS points out that gardeners may still plant an alternative - Gunnera magellanica, otherwise known as the "devil's strawberry" which it says "are great plants for wet soil on the margins of a large natural pond". They grow to a height of about 50 cms.

As it continues to rain it will be a kindness to sodden lawns and borders to keep off them until they have had a chance to drain properly especially on heavy soils. Footfall compacts the soil and reduces surface drainage. Do only the minimum to allow spring bulbs to be seen. When you can, remove all the hellebore leaves and this should stop mice nibbling buds particularly near to wall bottoms. Repairs to trellis supports and fences should be on



your "to do" lists before thinking of digging and planting. Perhaps this will give you more time to concentrate on selecting the seeds you would like to sow (indoors then outdoors) and plants that you plan to buy. Seed from previous years can be sown if they have been carefully kept in their packets and in a cool dry place. I keep mine in

a cupboard in the garage and sort out the ones that can be sown. It is important to emphasise that "new unopened" seeds are likely to germinate better than those kept from previous years. With "home-saved air-dried seed" I have had better results with peas and beans than newly-purchased ones. However many of these can have been cross-fertilized so you do not get a "true replication" of the plants previously grown. This is very true of broad beans. Commercial growers will keep certain seeds chilled (fridge temperature) to "stratify" them for up to a month so that when they are sown they will respond more quickly to warmth and moisture. Sweet peas are an example of seeds that can benefit from stratification.

Land behind Rialtos Restaurant

In October 2021 Rialtos put in a plan to develop the land behind the restaurant to be called "The Orchard". Various revisions have been made since then. The plans have now been rejectd by Northumberland CC: reasons for refusal included it would be out of character in the area, would make a potential increase in noise, harmful light and odour and possible increase in the risk of flooding.

Kirkwhelpington Quarry Plan

These plans should have been discussed at a Northumberland CC meeting in December, but this was deferred until March 2024. Plans can be viewed on the Northumberland CC website under 22/01909/CCMEIA. If the scheme goes ahead there will be even more traffic through Ponteland.

Former Police Station, Bell Villas

An application was made to turn this building into a restaurant in 2021. The original scheme aimed to provide space for 100 diners with no provision for car parking. After two years the scheme was approved subject to more details about car parking. Now a more modest scheme has been submitted with the dining spaces reduced to 33 with 20 outdoor seats in the small bit of land next to Sainsburys car park. The first floor of the building is to be offices.

Auberge derelict bungalow on Callerton Lane 13/03462/FUI

An application has been made to demolish the old bungalow and replace it with a five-bedroom property. A five-car garage is also in the plans.

Arriva has a new 777 bus service connecting Morpeth with Kirkley Hall, Ponteland, the Airport and Kingston Park. They hope to run the service seven days a week with an hourly service through the day and every two hours at night. It has started! It will stop at:-


